

As educators, we are quite rightly, obliged to monitor attendance to ensure all of our children benefit from a good education. You will be aware that at this time of the year, we share attendance information with you. This comes via a text initially and then if necessary a follow up telephone call or letter.

Attending is essential as you can see from the infographic below. Lack of attendance has a huge impact of a child's academic, social and long-term experience in education. If is child is ill, it cannot be helped, however it is important to have a conversation about how the impact of this can be mitigated so the children don't miss out on essential learning. There is also another consideration should a child be ill and a family chose to take their child out for additional holidays in term time. This will impact on your child's education significantly.

I am attaching below, a letter from the Assistant Director of Education sent to all schools this week, to note the implications of taking a term time holiday.

I hope you will appreciate the important need to discuss attendance, should your child's attendance be lower than the expected level of attendance.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE IN TERM TIME

Absence from school due to family holidays taken in term time can be disruptive to children's education. It can also be disruptive to other pupils in the class. In addition, I am concerned that there could be some misunderstanding of the law in relation to absence from school because of holidays taken during term time.

Any absence from school should be avoided unless for medical reasons, as it can have a serious effect on your child's educational progress, and can create difficulties for them on their return to school, particularly if they are joining a new school or class. It is important to note that only the Headteacher can authorise absence from school. Parents/carers cannot authorise the absence themselves.

Changes to legislation have removed the discretionary 10 day period of absence which covered family holidays. Schools can only grant requests for a leave of absence in term time in exceptional circumstances. If you believe that your circumstances are exceptional you can make a request to the school. In considering your request, the school will take into account the child's age, the time of year of the absence and the nature of the visit. The Headteacher will also consider the child's stage of education and progress and the child's overall attendance record. It is highly unlikely that leave will be authorised if examinations or other important tests will be missed. Headteachers will not authorise absence unless they believe your circumstances are exceptional. In all cases it is best to have a discussion with the Headteacher in order to look at the issues as they affect your child.

All unauthorised absences, including holidays that have not been sanctioned by the Headteacher, are accumulated and parents who fail to ensure regular attendance of their children at school can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice. The amount is £60 if paid within 21 days and £120 if paid between 21 and 28 days. It is therefore essential that parents take this into account if they are thinking of a family holiday in term-time.

The Department for Education define persistent absenteeism as below 90% attendance and schools may wish to use this figure to determine whether or not to pursue legal action such as the issuing of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Many people are working very hard to help your child to succeed. I trust you will support us in this matter, in partnership with your child's school.


I sent a letter out with the children on Friday, highlighting concerns around an increase in scarlet fever in Cumbria. We are mindful of some cases in school but also the vulnerability of some parents and children in our school community. As a result, we will be introducing increased hygiene measures in classes over the next three weeks. This is to make every effort to help reduce the risk of scarlet fever to reduce the risk to vulnerable family members and children. We are not seeing a huge increase in cases but we want to do our best to reassure families that we are reducing the potential for the spread. This will mean we are adding additional hand washing measures each day and cleaning surfaces in class more regularly. This is similar to the measures put in place during the return to school following covid. Hopefully, this will have a positive impact.

Just to clarify also, parents should seek a G.P. appointment if we or you think a child has scarlet fever. Children will need antibiotic treatment if they have scarlet fever before they are allowed to return to school.

Thank you for your understanding and support as we navigate this issue over the winter months.
